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Feature Article:

Obesity and Eating Disorders in the News

Though scientific journals publish an abundance of articles – comprised of case studies, commentaries, reviews, and results from randomized controlled trials – on obesity and eating disorders,



astonishingly little of our research finds its way to the public. A search for “eating disorders” in the Internet search engine Google News leads primarily to

blog entries and articles in small, local newspapers reporting on topics such as awareness campaigns and treatment center openings. Searches for specific eating disorder diagnoses such as

“anorexia” and “bulimia” lead primarily to tabloid reports regarding possible celebrity patients.

A search for “obesity” provides mixed results. Perhaps due to obesity’s omnipresent status as a dire public health concern, the search reveals a number of articles summarizing recent studies. However, articles that could have tremendous impact on public health (such as “Overweight Doctors Less Likely to Discuss Weight Loss with Patients” in the *Wall Street Journal*) are juxtaposed with gimmicky articles (such as “Biggest Loser’ host, dog Winky battle pet obesity” from *Reuters*).

There are, of course, explanations for the paucity of scientific articles in the news media. Explanations involving prevalence rates and public health significance aside, the media aim to grab readers’ attention – and gimmicky articles are often more appealing to the average reader than scientific articles.

Reserving opinions for the time being, obesity and eating disorder professionals may be interested in exactly what dregs of science make it into the mainstream. Below is a sampling of recent articles.

“Overweight Doctors Less Likely to Discuss Weight Loss With Patients,” *Wall Street Journal Health Blog*, January 30, 2012. Originally published in



Obesity, this study from the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health found

that obese physicians were less likely than their normal-weight colleagues to bring up the topic of weight loss with obese patients.

“U.S. Obesity Rates Plateau Since ’00,” *Bloomberg*, January 17, 2012. According to data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, obesity rates in the United States are beginning to level off. From 1999 to 2010, the obesity rate in adults increased from 30.5% to 35.7% after having doubled in the two decades prior to this period. However, the obesity

rate among boys ages 6 to 19 increased by almost 30%.

“Protocol to Treat Anorexia Is Faulted,” *New York Times*, January 2, 2012.

Originally published in the *Journal of Adolescent Health*, this study from the



University of California, San Francisco found that the strategy of slowly increasing caloric intake for adolescents hospitalized with anorexia

nervosa may be too conservative. More aggressive tactics are being considered, with caution, as clinicians and researchers balance patients’ caloric needs, psychological concerns, and medical complications during treatment.

Students in the SIG:

Meet this month’s featured student.

For an individual who received her undergraduate degree less than four years ago in 2008, Julia West has already made her mark in the OED field. While working towards her Bachelor of Arts



degrees in Psychology and Women and Gender Studies at Dickinson College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, Julia completed an undergraduate clinical internship at the Penn State Hershey Medical Center Partial Hospitalization Eating Disorders Program and was subsequently hired as

a research technician at the Penn State College of Medicine’s Department of Psychiatry. In Fall 2009, she entered the doctoral program in clinical psychology at Rutgers University, where she is currently a third year student under the mentorship of Dr. G. Terence Wilson.

Having recently received her Masters of Science degree, Julia is in track to receive her doctorate in May 2014.

According to Julia, her interest in eating disorders began after she declared her major in Women and Gender Studies at Dickinson. She recognized eating disorders, high levels of weight and body dissatisfaction, and pervasive admiration of the thin ideal in Western culture as significant women's health issues – and subsequently pursued both her double-major in Psychology and her undergraduate internship at Hershey.

Julia's interest in clinical psychology as a career was an off-shoot of her initial interest in the field of eating disorders and mental health, though since beginning graduate training, she has developed interests in additional areas of clinical psychology, particularly behavioral medicine and dialectical behavior therapy. Her experience as an intern at the Hershey Medical Center's Eating Disorders Program sparked her interest in and passion for clinical work—a passion that has continued to grow with each new clinical experience. In addition, Julia has been interested in research and teaching since her undergraduate days, and currently enjoys giving lectures on eating disorders and surrounding issues in various undergraduate courses at Rutgers.

Julia is interested in treatments for clinical level body dissatisfaction and overvaluation of shape and weight concerns, including different forms of mirror exposure and behavioral approaches that emphasize monitoring and reducing body checking and body avoidance behaviors. Julia is also interested in public perception of individuals with binge eating disorder, and is currently studying sex differences in such perceptions of women and men with binge eating disorder. In addition, Julia has a keen interest in the implementation of evidence-based eating disorder prevention programs, and evidence-based treatments for bulimia nervosa and binge eating disorder, particularly in training models for such treatments.

Outside of the OED field, Julia has a passion for baking and cooking, and

enjoys sharing her culinary experiments with family, friends, and neighbors. She loves spending time with her family and friends, particularly her 2-year-old niece, Sophia. Julia makes her home in Doylestown, Pennsylvania with her wonderful husband, Paul, and their puppy, Little Jerry Seinfeld.

My position statement reflects an interest in promoting CBT in the fullest and broadest terms possible (see pasted text below, or visit www.deanmckay4abctpresident.com; a link to the nomination form appears on the site). I hope you will also consider spreading word of my candidacy among the members of your respective SIGs. If any members would like to endorse my candidacy, please feel free to contact me.

Here is my position statement:

Position Statement: ABCT has been far and away the most important organization in my professional life going back to the first time I attended the convention as a graduate student in 1991. Since that first convention, I have been fortunate to serve the organization in a number of ways, including Associate Program Chair (2006) and Program Chair (2007), and as Representative-at-Large for Convention & Education Issues (2009-2012). My service to the organization in these ways has prepared me well for the position of President of ABCT. If elected, I will work toward the following broad goals:

- (1) Increase the dissemination of effective CBT methods through clinician networks whereby local or regional practitioners may provide mutually beneficial transmission of procedures and practices to best serve their clients.
- (2) Ensure there is accurate public knowledge of CBT, through more rapid and efficient media interactions.
- (3) Address the gap in the science and applications of CBT for diverse ethnic, cultural, and sexual orientation populations.
- (4) Focus on cross-specialization dissemination of CBT applications, in order to fully serve the diverse presenting needs of clients seeking empirically supported treatments.
- (5) Increase participation in the organization of practitioners from all domains for which CBT is applied, including behavioral health and medicine, neuroscience, marital and family therapy, personality disorders, and chronic mental health conditions.
- (6) Prepare for the changes anticipated for the DSM-5 in order that CBT is ready to compete in a new mental health marketplace.
- (7) Work to address changes in how grant-funding agencies support CBT proposals.

It is my contention that these broad areas can be uniquely addressed through ABCT. I would be honored and humbled

by the opportunity to serve ABCT as President and hope that you will vote for me to pursue these goals.
