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## Students in the SIG:

### Meet this month's featured student.

Originally from Seattle, WA, **Hannah Weisman** traveled south to Claremont, CA to major in Psychology and minor in Mathematics at **Pitzer College**. Shortly after graduating in 2009, she applied for a wide variety of psychology-related research assistantships – and found herself traveling north this time to Stanford, CA to work on eating disorders prevention with **Dr. Barr Taylor at Stanford University**. The position was a

perfect fit for her interests in feminism and gender psychology, and Hannah soon found herself impassioned by her efforts to help individuals with body image issues.

During her time at Stanford, Hannah worked on a number of projects, including a **community-based, randomized controlled trial of an online eating disorders and co-morbidities prevention program** for college women.



Most impressively, she also wrote and tested a universal 8-session online program, *The Whole Image*, that aims to change the social culture around body

image for high school students. The program was shown to be effective in reducing eating disorder risk among high school females and a revision of the program is currently undergoing additional testing.

Now back in Southern California as a second-year clinical psychology doctoral student at the **University of California—Santa Barbara**, Hannah continues to demonstrate her passion about body image issues and eating disorders through two projects. In one study, she is examining the **relationships between daily loss of control eating, stress, and coping** using Daily Diary methodology with adult patients in a community clinic. In a second study, she is examining the **associations between body image, weight stigma, and levels of general stigma towards individuals with mental health disorders** among sixth grade students.

With obvious dedication to and enthusiasm for her work, Hannah is surely on track to meet her professional aspirations. Her long-term goal is to secure a **faculty position** that will allow her to conduct community-based eating disorder prevention and intervention research and teach courses in psychology.

And outside of the eating disorders world, Hannah enjoys **playing volleyball, hiking, spending time at the beach (oh, that lucky Californian!), and playing with her dog, Luna.**
